Submission Guidelines:

- § Abstracts should be not more than 300 words, clearly outlining the research question, methodology and preliminary findings or arguments.
- § Abstract must be followed by 5-7 key words.
- § The complete paper must not be of more than 4500-5000 words including references.
- § The latest MLA guidelines (9th edition) must be followed.
- § Please include a brief bionote, written in third person, of not more than 100 words along with the submission in a separate word file.
- § Submissions should be original and not previously published or submitted for consideration.
- § We encourage early-career researchers and interdisciplinary collaborations.

Submissions are invited in English for a special issue of Mind Space (Volume 10) focused on Indigenous Knowledge Systems (IKS) as a vital area of inquiry. Indigenous knowledge encompasses the rich, complex, and diverse ways of knowing, being, and doing that have sustained communities and environments for generations. These systems, deeply rooted in cultural traditions and local ecologies, hold transformative potential for addressing contemporary global challenges such as climate change, health inequities, and biodiversity loss.

This interdisciplinary issue seeks critical contributions that interrogate, celebrate, and apply Indigenous knowledge systems across disciplines. This issue will be particularly interested in research that bridges Indigenous and non-Indigenous epistemologies, explores ethical approaches to IKS, or highlights its relevance in science, technology, education, and policy.

Original and unpublished research, theoretical papers and case studies from scholars, practitioners, and Indigenous knowledge holders are invited. Potential topics include but are not limited to:
